Sometimes the vaccines that protect you from serious diseases may also cause some discomfort. Mild reactions to vaccinations do occur, but serious reactions are rare. The most common reactions are redness, fever, slight swelling, and pain at the injection site.

- Apply a cold pack or cloth to the injection area for 5-10 minutes at a time
- Use or exercise the arm in which the vaccine was given this will distribute the medication quickly and reduce soreness

 - Drink plenty of fluids
 - Dress lightly
